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Trustees' report for the year ended 31 March 2022

The Trustees, who are also Directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their annual report together with the audited financial statements of the charity for the year 1 April 2021 to 31 March 2022. The annual report serves the purposes of both a Trustees' report and a directors' report under company law. The Trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements of the charitable company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charitable company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Since the charity qualifies as small under section 382 of the Companies Act 2006, the strategic report required of medium and large companies under the Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Directors' Report) Regulations 2013 has been omitted.

This report sets out the purpose, governance, staffing/volunteer details, activities and financial position of the Charitable Company, Derbyshire Carers Association, (DCA) during the financial year ended 31st March 2022.

During the year, the Covid 19 epidemic continued to have a major impact on the unpaid Adult and Young Carers that DCA supports. Access to social care and health services continued to be difficult and/or impossible to arrange for the family members that Carers were looking after. This brought added stresses and strains both for the Adult and Young Carers that DCA was supporting, and also for our staff and volunteers. However, despite all the difficulties, DCA continued to adapt services, change working practices and increase both the level and range of support provided for Carers. Over the year, DCA supported 7,353 Young and Adult Carers with 33,058 interactions. Trustees are very proud of the work undertaken by the Charity and all who were involved.

### Structure, governance and management

Derbyshire Carers Association is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 16th September 1996 and registered with the Charity Commission on 10 June 1997.

DCA was established under a Memorandum of Association, which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is ruled under its Articles of Association.

The Association is governed through a Trustee Board, who are recruited through the local community. The Trustee Board are responsible for setting the strategic direction of the charity and ensuring that it is compliant with everything legal and contractual. The Trustee Board meet at least five times each year as well as attending quarterly sub groups. All Trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no remuneration for duties undertaken. As a company limited by guarantee, the company does not have any paid up share capital. Each member of the company has, however, guaranteed an amount not exceeding £10.

New Trustees are inducted to the organisation and receive training where appropriate in line with Charity Commission guidance.

### <u>Employees</u>

There are 54 members of the Team who work within services and projects supporting Young and Adult Carers across Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire.

### Volunteers

There are 43 active Volunteers within the Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire services. These include Trustees, Telephone Befrienders and Support Group Volunteers. Their valuable contribution enables our services to reach more Carers and offer greater support.

### Structure, governance and management (continued)

#### Carers

There are over 12,000 Young and Adult Carers in Derbyshire registered with DCA. All registered Carers receive regular online and postal newsletters and e-bulletins to inform them of current services and new opportunities from DCA and partners. They can contact DCA at any time for information, advice and support and attend our peer support groups, training sessions and workshops.

### Objectives and activities

### . Policies and objectives

The charity's objectives are to relieve the stresses experienced by Young and Adult Carers of people with illness, frailty, disability, a mental health problem or an addiction through information, advice and support services. The charity delivers a comprehensive service to Adult and Young Carers throughout Derbyshire to increase practical, emotional and social support and improve wellbeing. In Nottinghamshire, we deliver a Carers engagement and promotion service to improve identification, involvement and coproduction.

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charlty Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our objectives and also in planning our future objectives. In particular, the Trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the alms and objectives they have set.

### . Activities undertaken to achieve objectives

Services and projects are created to support Carers with the practical, physical and emotional impact of care giving. These include information and guidance, assessments, emergency and support planning and training. These services are delivered within the community or a Carer's home, over the telephone or online. We have formed partnerships with health, statutory and community services to complement our offer and connect Carers with professional and current advice. Our engagement and promotion service raises awareness of the impact of caregiving and importance of connecting Carers to support services. To achieve this, we inform, train and support professionals within health, statutory, education and voluntary services to identify, support and refer Carers.

### Achievements and performance

### . Review of activities

DCA has continued to review all provisions as we transition from the challenges brought about by the pandemic. Resources had previously been allocated where there was an increased demand to support Carers to reduce pressures. Service previously had been delivered online and by telephone to reduce risks and follow guidelines. To increase flexibility and choice, we are now offering a hybrid support model where services are available online and face-to-face. These are delivered where they are most appropriate for Carers and the service. Where there is an urgent need, Carers are usually contacted the same day. Where there is a less urgent need, Carers are usually contacted within three days.

### Achievements and performance (continued)

## Derbyshire Carers Assessment and Support Service

This year we entered our fifth year of the Derbyshire County Council commissioned Carers Assessment and Support Service to Carers and familles residing throughout Derbyshire. There are 36 members of the team in a variety of roles including Carer support, peer support and volunteering. We provide a wealth of support and advice services to improve Carers quality of life, Increase access to support and enhance wellbeing. Achievements within this year include:

- 1,764 new Carers registered with DCA for support
- 20,158 information and advice sessions delivered either over the telephone or face-to-face
- 1,402 Carers received a Carers Assessment and Support Plan
- 1,393 Carers have been awarded a Carers Personal Budget to fund services that reduce pressure and increase support
- 838 Emergency plans have been completed
- 600 Grants made to families to help with the impact of Covid
- 65 Carer Support Groups facilitated
- 174 Workshops and training sessions attended by 1,323 Carers

### Derbyshire Young Carers Service

This is the fifth year that Derbyshire Carers Association has provided the DCC commissioned service to support Young Carers. Our service provides one-to-one, group and family support that reduces inappropriate caring duties for children, increases access to support and protects childhoods. This year, the service has supported higher numbers of Young Carers than in previous years of the contract. In 2020-21 we supported 267 different Young Carers and their families. In 2021-22 we have supported 309 different Young Carers and their families, some for a short period of a few months, and others for many more months. Achievements within this year include:

- 155 new Young Carers referred for support
- 1080 one-to-one support sessions
- 1,304 Family support sessions
- 284 Young Carers accessing a group activity

### Nottinghamshire Carers Engagement and Promotion Service

During this reporting period, we entered the third year of the Carers Engagement and Promotion service. This service promotes the interests of carers and encourages carers to participate in consultation and engagement activities. The service also undertakes consultancy and development activities with a range of organisations, to improve the experience of carers. The team support GP Practices and schools in mid and south Nottinghamshire and community services across the whole County.

The service now hosts a Carers Space project alongside the Engagement and Promotion service. This service enables local authority and health staff to work together with people and carers with lived experience and other key stake holders, involving them as equal partners in the design, commission or review of services, strategies, or policies.

### The National Lottery

Our National Lottery funded Telephone Befriending service provides our most isolated Carers with a weekly telephone call from a Volunteer. For consistency, the calls are made by the same Volunteer and usually last around an hour. During this year 24 Volunteers made 3,206 hours of calls to 169 Carers.

## Achievements and performance (continued)

### Children in Need

Many of our Young Carers either care for a loved one with mental ill health or experience symptoms of this themselves. The Children in Need funded project provides young people with specialist help and support and connects them to appropriate support within the community.

### Funding and donations

We have been able to provide additional services for adult and young Carers through the generosity of services, companies and individuals. These include The Clothworkers Foundation, Derby County FC, Central England Cooperative, DCHS Charitable Trust and Garfield Weston Foundation.

### Financial review

### , Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the DCA accounting policies.

### Review of the year

The year saw a net reduction in resources of £196,374 (2021: Increase of £37,159). Total income decreased from £1,933,619 to £1,680,522 and expenditure decreased from £1,896,460 to £1,876,896. The accumulated funds of the charity at 31 March 2022 are shown in total in the balance sheet, which also details the restricted and unrestricted funds.

### . Reserves policy

The management committee have established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets ('the free reserves') held by the charity should be between three and six months of the resources expended. At this level, the Trustees/Directors feel they would be able to continue in short term the current activities of the charity in the event of a significant drop in funding.

### Statement of Trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees (who are also the directors of the charity for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under company law, the Trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its Incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities SORP (FRS 102);
- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards (FRS 102) have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charity's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

### Disclosure of information to auditors

Each of the persons who are Trustees at the time when this Trustees' report is approved has confirmed that:

Independent auditors' report to the Members of Derbyshire Carers Association

### Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Derbyshire Carers Association (the 'charity') for the year ended 31 March 2022 which comprise the statement of financial activities, the balance sheet, the statement of cash flows and the related notes, including a summary of significant accounting policies. ### Other information

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact.

In preparing the financial statements, the Trustees are responsible for assessing the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Trustees either intend to liquidate the charitable company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

## Auditors' responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Irregularities, including fraud, are instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. We design procedures in line with our responsibilities, outlined above, to detect material misstatements in respect of irregularities, including fraud. The extent to which our procedures are capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud is detailed below:

Our approach to identifying and assessing the risks of material misstatement in respect of irregularities, including fraud and non-compliance with laws and regulations, was as follows:

- the senior statutory auditor ensured that the engagement team collectively had the appropriate competence, capabilities and skills to identify or recognise non-compliance with applicable laws and regulations;
- we identified the laws and regulations applicable to the charitable company through discussions with directors and other management, and from our commercial knowledge and experience of the sector;
- we focused on specific laws and regulations which we considered may have a direct material effect on the financial statements or the operations of the charitable company, including the financial reporting legislation, Companies Act 2006, taxation legislation, anti-bribery, employment, and environmental and health and safety legislation;
- we assessed the extent of compliance with the laws and regulations identified above through making enquiries of management and inspecting legal correspondence; and
- identified laws and regulations were communicated within the audit team regularly and the team remained alert to instances of non-compliance throughout the audit.

We assessed the susceptibility of the charitable company's financial statements to material misstatement, including obtaining an understanding of how fraud might occur, by:

- making enquiries of management as to where they considered there was susceptibility to fraud, their knowledge of actual, suspected and alleged fraud; and
- considering the internal controls in place to mitigate risks of fraud and non-compliance with laws and regulations.

To address the risk of fraud through management bias and override of controls, we:

- performed analytical procedures to identify any unusual or unexpected relationships;
   tested journal entries to identify unusual transactions;
- assessed whether judgements and assumptions made in determining the accounting estimates were indicative of potential bias; and
- investigated the rationale behind significant or unusual transactions.

In response to the risk of irregularities and non-compliance with laws and regulations, we designed procedures which included, but were not limited to:

- agreeing financial statement disclosures to underlying supporting documentation;
- reading the minutes of meetings of those charged with governance;
- enquiring of management as to actual and potential litigation and claims; and
- · reviewing correspondence with HMRC, relevant regulators and the charitable company's legal advisors.

Because of the inherent limitations of an audit, there is a risk that we will not detect all irregularities, including those leading to a material misstatement in the financial statements or non-compliance with regulation. This risk increases the more that compliance with a law or regulation is removed from the events and transactions reflected in the financial statements, as we will be less likely to become aware of instances of non-compliance. The risk is also greater regarding irregularities occurring due to fraud rather than error, as fraud involves intentional concealment, forgery, collusion, omission or misrepresentation.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2022

#### 1. General information

Derbyshire Carers Association is a private company limited company by guarantee, incorporated in England and Wales. The members of the company are the trustees named on page 1. Its registered office is 3 Park Road, Ripley, Derbyshire, DE5 3EF.

### 2. Accounting policies

### 2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Derbyshire Carers Association meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

### 2.2 Going concern

The are no material uncertainties relating to the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

### 2.3 Income

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

The recognition of income from legacies is dependent on establishing entitlement, the probability of receipt and the ability to estimate with sufficient accuracy the amount receivable. Evidence of entitlement to a legacy exists when the charity has sufficient evidence that a gift has been left to them (through knowledge of the existence of a valid will and the death of the benefactor) and the executor is satisfied that the property in question will not be required to satisfy claims in the estate. Receipt of a legacy must be recognised when it is probable that it will be received and the fair value of the amount receivable, which will generally be the expected cash amount to be distributed to the charity, can be reliably measured.

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, and conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probably and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), the general volunteer time of the Friends is not recognised.

On receipt, donated professional services and facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount it would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

Income tax recoverable in relation to investment income is recognised at the time the investment income is receivable.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2022

### 2. Accounting policies (continued)

### 2.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Expenditure on raising funds includes all expenditure incurred by the charity to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities events and non-charitable trading.

Expenditure on charitable activities is incurred on directly undertaking the activities which further the charity's objectives, as well as any associated support costs.

### 2.5 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the institution with whom the funds are deposited.

### 2.6 Taxation

The charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

### 2.7 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets costing £500 or more are capitalised and recognised when future economic benefits are probable and the cost or value of the asset can be measured reliably.

Tangible fixed assets are initially recognised at cost. After recognition, under the cost model, tangible fixed assets are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. All costs incurred to bring a tangible fixed asset into its intended working condition should be included in the measurement of cost.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2022

### 2. Accounting policies (continued)

### 2.7 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation (continued)

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of tangible fixed assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives.

Depreciation is provided on the following basis:

Freehold property - 2% on cost Fixtures and fittings - 25% on cost Computer equipment - 25% on cost

During the year, the charitable company has changed its depreciation policy on fixtures and fittings and computer equipment from 25% reducing balance to 25% on costs which will better represent these assets' net book value.

### 2.8 Investments

Investment property is shown at the most recent valuation. Any aggregate surplus or deficit arising from changes in market value is transferred to a revaluation reserve.

### 2.9 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

### 2.10 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and In hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

### 2.11 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably.

Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised in the statement of financial activities as a finance cost.

### 2.12 Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

### 2. Accounting policies (continued)

### 2.13 Operating leases

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the statement of financial activities on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

### 2.14 Pensions

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the charity to the fund in respect of the year.

### 2.15 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund.

## 3. Judgements in applying accounting policies and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The trustees do not consider there to be any judgements or key sources of estimation uncertainty to be disclosed within the financial statements.

### **Cessation Costs**

This represents the amount of funds which are tied up in redundancy & lease teminations.

### **General Property**

This represents the amount of funds which are tied up in freehold property and therefore not necessarily available for use in day to day operations.

### **Restricted Funds**

### Charitable Carers Grants

Monies from charitable trusts applied for on behalf of carers and subsequently paid over to them.

### Glossop, High Peak Transport and Sitting

These funds can help carers in remote, rural areas of Derbyshire.

### Carers Personal Budget

Personal budgets scheme replacing Derbyshire Carers Breaks Scheme.

### Ripley Subscriptions

Funds held for the benefit of Carers in Ripley.

### Tesco Bags of Help

Funding from Tesco to support carers in the Derbyshire area.

### Carers in Employment

These funds help to support carers to remain in employment.

### **Glossop Carers**

Funding to support carers in the Glossop area.

### Crisis Fund

Donations and fundaising are used to put together a crisis fund for carers and their families finding themselves in financial hardship.

### Morrisons - Carers Cookery

Grant received from Morrisons Foundation for a 'Carers Cookery skills' project.

### **Youth Activity Grant**

Grant received from Derbyshire County Council for an "Everyone's a film maker" project. It allows young carers to have a break away from their caring role.

#### BBC Children in Need

A three year project to fund a young carer mental health suport worker to work with young carers and their families.

### Befriending - National Lottery

A two year project to set up a telephone befriending service to combat loneliness and isolation of carers living in rural areas across Derbyshire.

### **Buxton Carers Support Grant**

This relates to money held for a support group. The carer dealing with the group stood down and passed the the monies onto DCA. The money spend from this fund has been for their Christmas meals at the request of the support group. The fund does not belong to DCA, it belongs to the support group.

### Winter Covid Grants

This is to support those most in need across England with the cost of food, energy, water and other essentials during the Covid pandemic.

### Social Connected Fund

Project funded by DDCVS and PCC Vulnerability Funding for a Social Connector Coordinator to provide a service for vulnerable socially disadvantaged adult carers by providing face to face social connection, support and buddying to connect them with their local community.

### **Carers Counselling Service**

Providing counselling service to carers.

### **Duke of Devonshire**

Providing emergency food supplies to Derby City carers.

### **Derbyshire Community Foundation**

This relates to the provision of emergency food to carers.

### Innovation Fund - Crisis Workers

The Innovation Fund employs two Carer Primary Response Workers who support Carers and their families during a crisis. We have recognised an increase in the number of referrals for Carers who need urgent interventions and support. The support can be for themselves or the person they care for and covering a wide range of issues including mental health difficulties, safeguarding, housing and carer breakdown. The team also works in collaboration with other crisis services to create pathways for urgent referrals.

### Carers Trust - Quilter Aspitarions Fund

Grant awarded to provide planned activities for young carers in groups and individually.

### **Carers Space - Notts County Council**

Co-production project for carers in Nottinghamshire and Nottingham City to increase engagement and collaboration and help design future services.

### Masonic Charitable Foundation Trust

Grant awarded to provide specialist training to our Young Carers support workers and team.

### Carers Trust - 'Carers Getting Together'

Grant awarded to provide a day activity for carers to help reduce isolation and improve carers' health and wellbeing.

### 23. Pension commitments

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charity in an independently administered fund.
