I want to say a big thank-you to everyone in our Carers Community for the warm welcome given to me over the past few months while I have been meeting Carers, caredfor and all the professionals supporting them. I have been impressed by

the resilience of Carers who quietly support their family and loved ones without thanks or payment.

Their lives, we hope will be made better as result of reform of the law relating to support for Carers. The Social Bill has now completed all its stages in the House of Commons and will now return to the House of Lords for consideration of amendments. When the dust has settled DCA will be providing a synopsis of outcomes for our many Carers.

The raison d'être of DCA is to care for those who find themselves caring. We aim to provide information and advice when they need it. We're never complacent, always looking to improve our services to Carers and I'd like to share with you a few of the developments that are moving forward.

During Carers week we will also be launching our new website - it's bright and fresh and more easily accessible. carers week Quest - 9th to 15th June

Carers Week is an annual awareness campaign celebrating and recognising the contribution made by the UK's 6.5 million Carers who look after an ill, frail or disabled family member or friend or neighbour.

It takes place from Monday 9th to Sunday 15th June 2014. Its aim is to improve the lives of Carers and the people they care for.

It does this by raising awareness of Carers at a national, regional and local level. Hundreds of organisations and individuals join in each year to make it one of the UK's most successful awareness campaigns.

The Quest is an exciting initiative to encourage improved collaborative working in local communities to reach out to Carers who are currently missing out on services and support.

Why is it needed?

One in eight of the UK population are currently Carers looking after an ill, frail or disabled family member or friend. The very nature of caring means very often people don't at first (or sometimes ever), identify themselves as Carers. Rather, they think of themselves simply as wife, husband, son, daughter, mum, dad or perhaps grandparent, niece or nephew helping a loved one.

Without the right help and support caring can have a devastating impact - Carers can quickly become cut off with their physical and emotional health, work and their finances - all affected.

Every year Carers Week is a chance for us to highlight the amazing contribution Carers make to our society.

There are 6.5 million unpaid Carers in the UK and many of these put their own health, work and social lives to one side to care for loved ones.

Many people first come into contact with social care during a health crisis such as a hospital admission, when they and their families are often distressed and don't know where to go for support and advice.

Everyone at Derbyshire Carers Association is dedicated to supporting Carers and would like to invite Carers to the many events organised for Carers Week. Pop along to an event near you and learn what we can do you help you - the family Carer.



Derbyshire Carers initiative reaches out to GPs

Our Challenge: We are launching the Derbyshire 'Carers Pledge' during June's Carers Week and will be requesting that all GP practices throughout Derbyshire consider signing up.

There is already great work done in many GP practices and we want to share experiences and make sure that all Carers living in Derbyshire can expect the same service, regardless of which surgery they are registered with.

To ensure all Carers in Derbyshire are supported we will also be asking hospitals, schools and employers to recognise Carers and discover more about the support that is available in Derbyshire.

We hope that the Carers Pledge will ensure Carers feel valued and will be supported to continue in their caring role.

The Pledge asks that Derbyshire GPs:

Maintain a Carers Register within their practice.

- Ensure there is good quality and accessible information available for Carers.
- Invite Carers for the annual flu vaccination.
- Improve the way that Carers are identified, supported and signposted.
- Nominate a Carers Champion who will be a point of contact for identifying and promoting Carer support in the practice.

In return we will:

- Provide up-to-date information and resources to be available within the practice.
- Invite Practice Teams to Carers Express training events.
- Support practices with setting up Carers' events and services.
- Present each Practice with a Carers Pledge Certificate and resources.

Hospitals Carers Pledge

Many Carers start their caring journey within a hospital when a loved one has been diagnosed with an illness or disability or admitted for emergency care.

Identifying and supporting Carers at the onset will reduce the likelihood of isolation, poor health and wellbeing and financial difficulties. Hospitals need dedicated workers who can identify Carers looking after patients and make sure that they get the support they need.

We want hospitals in Derbyshire to:

- Ensure there is good quality and accessible information available for Carers.
- Improve the way that Carers are identified, supported and signposted.
- Nominate Carers Champions who will be a point of contact for identifying and promoting Carer support in the hospital.

In return we will:

- Provide up-to-date information and resources to be available within the hospital.
- Invite hospital teams to Carers Express events.
- Support hospitals with setting up Carers events and services.
- Present each hospital with a Carers Pledge Certificate and resources.

We will be launching the Carers Pledge with a celebration event at the start of Carers Week on 6th June from 12 Noon to 1pm at the Chesterfield Centre followed by a 'Carers Pledge Roadshow' where we will spend the week visiting places that have signed the Pledge and the team will engage and offer suitable support.

Enhancing the Healing Environment Project with Derbyshire County Council

In autumn 2013, Derbyshire Carers Association was invited to collaborate on a project with Derbyshire County Council Adult Care Services to contribute to the Accommodation, Care and Support Strategy for older people in Derbyshire, and specifically to enhancing the environment of four homes for older people, to make them more suitable for people with increasing levels of dementia.

The project was supported by funding form the Department of Health, which accepted Derbyshire County Council Adult Care Services as an Enhancing the Healing Environment pilot project.

To these ends Derbyshire Carers Association were invited in to provide consultation on achieving tangible, physical improvements to outdoor spaces at Castle Court, Thomas College and The Grange homes. Developing resources to support way-finding and orientation at all four homes.

Addressing sustainability of the improvements beyond the lifetime of the project which included aspects of design, staff training and developing community involvement and finally the production of a final evaluation report of the work which describes the process and changes achieved, including the impact of the lives of the residents.

The DCA-led elements of the project were managed via PRINCE2 methodology – which was scaled to fit the needs of the 6 month-long project, which was completed at the end of March 2014.

Project evaluation findings suggest a high level of success within these areas, which is supported with anecdotal evidence from staff and residents and the responses to the formal evaluation systems.

I'm very pleased to be able to share with you, some examples of what our

Carers Voice members have achieved over the last twelve months of the project:

- Carers being able to travel with the cared-for to hospital appointments in an ambulance (Amber Valley).
- Better liaison at hospital discharge through the Teaming Up for Transition Team.
- Carers Voice members have joined their local Patient Participation groups, to further champion Carers' issues.
- Contributed to the design of publicity material promoting the project.
- Participants have spoken out at Strategy and Network days across the County.
- Requested and realised more Carer Support Workers' presence at support meetings.
- Feedback and information obtained through questionnaires for evaluation and actioning.
- Carers Voice members will be able to contribut to the new Strategy for Carers for the next five year period.

Unfortunately it is with regret, we have to announce that the Carers Voice project funding has come to an end.

The project has welcomed many new faces with regular meetings being held in three different parts of the county: Buxton, Chesterfield and Ripley.

Many opinions and comments have been discussed and taken and presented to those responsible for Carer Services in Derbyshire.

All existing Carers Voice representatives wishing to continue to have their opinions heard, should contact Louise Green at DCA head office,

who will be able to liaise with the relevant authorities.

It is envisaged that the issues regarding Carers will be taken onboard by the Stakeholder Engagement Team at Derbyshire County Council.

I would like to personally thank all those who have been involved with this project. It has been a privilege to work with so many Carers for the common good of improving lives for Carers in the County. Best wish

Elderly care demands - to 'outstrip' family supply

The number of older people in England needing care will outstrip the number of family members able to provide it by 2017, a Think Tank has warned.

An Institute for Public Policy Research (IPPR) report estimates that by 2030 there will be more than two million people aged 65 and over with no child living nearby to give care if needed.

The IPPR said the country must 'build new community institutions' to cope. The Government said it was working to make sure more people got care at home.

The IPPR report estimates that, of the two million people it says will have no child living nearby to care for them in England in 2030, 230,000 will need more than 20 hours of care per week.

Left to cope

Clare McNeil, senior research fellow at the think tank, said the supply of unpaid care to older people by their adult children would not keep pace with future demand.

'Thousands of people in their 60s and 70s today could be left to cope on their own when they need care in the future, with overstretched services unable to make up the shortfall,' she said.

'Britain needs to build new community institutions capable of sustaining us through the changes ahead and to adapt the social structures already in place, such as family and care, public services, the workplace and neighbourhoods.'

To fill the care 'gap', the report suggested the UK should:

- Widen the use of 'neighbourhood networks', highlighting those run in Leeds by older people and offering activities to reduce social isolation as well as providing care and support
- Invest in strengthening community groups in areas with the 'weakest record for community-based care'
- Follow international examples, highlighting initiatives in Germany, Australia and Japan's 10-year nationwide campaign 'to train one million dementia supporters'
- House public services for different age groups, such as childcare and care for the elderly, together in the same buildings as is done in Germany
- Strengthen employment rights for Carers.

The report also highlights the number of older people providing care, and estimates that the amount of intensive care provided by spouses and partners will rise by 90% over the next 15 years.

It says the average annual cost for those who pay for care is currently $\pounds 25,000$ for home care and $\pounds 36,000$ for a nursing home.

The government said it was working to integrate health and council care services to ensure more older people received care at home.

Unpaid Carers filling the gap in health and social care

Over the last few months much has been written about the role of 'Carers'– those who provide care in a paid capacity 'care support workers' and those who care unpaid for a friend or family member who due to illness, disability, a mental health problem or an addiction cannot cope without their support 'carers'.

There is a clear difference between these two types of roles and Derbyshire Carers Association, a Carers Trust Network Partner, who supports unpaid Carers feels that it is very important to make that distinction.

Today there are seven million Carers providing unpaid care to a family member, neighbour or friend in need.

Unpaid Carers save the economy in excess of £119bn every year and often bridge a gap that health and social care departments cannot fill because of staffing and financial constraints.

Everyday unpaid Carers provide help and support to people that the state is unable to provide, keeping people out of our very busy hospitals, out of care homes and as far as is possible helping to maintain their independence in their own home. But there is a price to be paid for this, and it is too often the unpaid Carer who pays it with in many cases severe financial consequences and an impact on their own health and wellbeing.

Recent features in the national press and on TV about, for example, 15 minute calls and zero hours contracts are only a symptom of the real underlying problems. Whilst they highlight the fact that paid for care providers, including ourselves who provide paid care in order to give unpaid Carers a break, are struggling to cope with delivering care to the volume of people that require help and support, the stories do not address the underlying issue of a system which cannot cope and is becoming increasingly dependent on the UK's seven million unpaid carers.

Without unpaid Carers the system would simply not be able to cope and they need support.

Elderly under threat from scams

Local care agency 'Home Instead' has launched an offensive on the invisible criminals...the scammers, the con artists and the tricksters who are defrauding our elderly population out of their life savings, valuables, their identity and in some cases, even their homes.

Scamming is a huge business. Email, telephone and postal scams prey on the vulnerable, in particular, the elderly, who are viewed as easy targets. Last year, an estimated £3.5 billion was fraudulently taken from individuals in the UK.

THINK JESSICA

Jessica was a victim. She was repeatedly tricked into sending cash



and making money transfers to criminals over the space of five years. Her family tried without success to make her understand she was being scammed, but the psychology the criminals used was so powerful Jessica refused to believe it. She totally believed everything the scammers wrote or told her over the phone. She thought the bogus 'clairvoyants' and officials' were her friends.

Jessica (83) died in 2007. She was still waiting for her promised prizes. Approximately 30,000 scam letters were removed from her home.

We're pleased to announce we have been successful in the Big Lottery funding application, 'Awards for All'. The funding will support a six month pilot project which will identify, engage with - and ensure support for - Young Carers in Derbyshire. The project aims to raise awareness of Young Carers, their issues and to reach the often 'Hidden Carers'.

Young Carers can be caring for a range of reasons; research suggests that care is usually provided to support a relative (parent, sibling, grandparent etc.) who is experiencing illness or disability, be this physical, or psychological.

Responsibilities can range from helping out with domestic chores, home finances and management, through to providing full personal care for a significantly disabled individual.

Many Young Carers don't necessarily see themselves as Carers, either through lack of awareness or because they're actively encouraged to 'play down their role' by family, through fear or shame. Further complicating this are the blurred boundaries of responsibility between adults and children's services and a lack of awareness among many professional groups of Young Carers' needs and concerns.

The stresses and coping difficulties which are attributed to adult Carers can be found in Young Carers also. Although it has been suggested that some Young Carers cope better than their adult counterparts because many of them have grown up within their caring role and 'normalized' their experience. Young Carers still remain vulnerable and in need of support.

Working closely with Schools, Social Services, Health, Independent and Voluntary Sector partners this pilot project will aim to:

- Raise awareness of the role of Young Carers using a poster publicity campaign focused in schools, GP practices and community facilities.
- Develop resources, in consultation with schools, aimed at supporting the particular and specific needs of Young Carers.
- Provide practical support for Young Carers in line with the requirements of The Children and Families Bill as amended in October 2013.
- Use technology in order to reach out to hidden Carers, with particular focus on Facebook and Twitter as means of communicating with Young Carers across the county.
- Facilitate a peer support network where Young Carers can seek additional help.

Carers Breaks Scheme

We are pleased to confirm that the Department of Health Carers' Breaks Scheme for Derbyshire and Glossop is still available to Carers in the County.

Carers reaching certain criteria can apply for funding of up to £250; Carers who hold an Emergency Carers' Card, who are registered as a Carer with their GP, provide care for at least 35 hours a week and able to evidence a 'major impact' in at least six areas in their Derbyshire County Council Contingency Plan and Self Assessment are eligible to apply.

Major impact is defined as: 'Caring severely limits your ability to maintain this aspect of your life. This causes you much concern, stress or distress'.

How the money can be used:

- The money cannot be used to provide social care for the cared-for person - it is just for the Carer.
- Funding must be used to help improve the health and well-being of the Carer.
- It can be used in many ways, for example; as a contribution towards a gym membership or supporting another hobby. It could also be used to purchase more practical help, for example - assistance with gardening, decorating or cleaning.

We are particularly interested in hearing from Carers in the Glossop area and would like to remind those Carers who have already accessed funding that it is available for a second year.

For 30 years I worked in the coal industry but took early retirement at the time my wife was diagnosed with cancer. The support we received from MacMillan was exceptional, unfortunately they only support cancer patients.

I found out that the support available to cancer and heart patients and their Carers was good but not so good for patients with other conditions and their Carers.

My wife died in 2010 and I decided to use my time acting as a volunteer where it would be most effective. After attending a volunteer forum DCA became aware of my managerial skills and experience and they asked me if I would be interested in joining their Board.

The Board at that time was mainly composed of health care professionals and if the charity was to develop, a Board with a wider range of skills was required.

To better understand how DCA and Carers worked, I became a volunteer at the Carers Centre in Chesterfield.

As a board member I work to maintain the good reputation DCA has for providing a quality service, ensuring we work within the statutory rules and regulations.

We currently work to a number of quality standards, eg: Pqasso (a charity's quality mark) and we need to maintain these since, not only do they demonstrate a quality organisation, they become essential when applying for certain funds.

As you know, funding for national and local government is reducing - with services and responsibilities being diverted into the voluntary sector where possible.

I believe our networking with other agencies and willingness to enter joint contracts to be one of the ways forward.

We need to be constantly aware of what government agencies are planning and also what other charities are doing, since we are all bidding for the same funds.

Whilst full board meetings are every two months, there are many other meetings in-between, geared not only to the smooth running of DCA but planning with the senior management team for the future.
